Furnace Mountain Band

Hailed as "the area's premier acoustic band" by The Washingtonian, Furnace Mountain Band plays music from the American Appalachian traditions and original compositions that run the spectrum from lively and raucous to poignant and poetic. They have performed throughout the world, from the Yangtze River in China to the banks of the Shenandoah River, where they are the host band of the Watermelon Pickers' Festival.



#### **April 12, 7 pm** Scuffletown



Scuffletown is an acoustic high energy duo consisting of Marc Carraway on guitar and vocals and John Whitlow on harmonica, accordion, flute and vocals. The band has performed a unique blend of original music and acoustic roots, blues, jazz, bluegrass, country at wineries, marinas, concert shows, pubs and boat docks for over 25 years, recording 4 acclaimed albums along the way.

May 10, 7 pm Wren Masters

The Wren Masters specialize in the historical performance of 17th and 18th century music on period instruments: baroque violin, viola da gamba and harpsichord. Hailed by the Washington Post for their "crisp ensemble, mellowness, and stylistic awareness," the musicians of this baroque ensemble are members of the W&M Applied Music Faculty, and the Governor's Musik of Colonial Williamsburg. Originally formed in 2005, the Wrens are named after their favorite performance space, William & Mary's Christopher Wren Chapel, circa 1693.

### Jane Rackley

Jane Rackley's mother taught her to knit when she was a child, and she has been knitting since she was young.

She enjoys challenging Norwegian patterns. The challenge is translating instructions correctly.

She learned to knit gnomes when her husband, HC, was working in Norway. She bought two gnomes at a craft fair in their tiny town. HC's housemate, Bob, wanted one too. When he returned the next day, all had sold, and no one knew who had knit them. HC told Bob not to worry, Jane would knit him one, and she did. It became a hobby, and the Norwegians in town would walk by to see new creations displayed in windows. Jane has knit and given away hundreds of gnomes over the years.

Jane loves thinking about the person she is knitting for as she works, imagining them wearing the sweater, cap, socks, mittens. She enjoys knitting with real wool, it is so versatile and warm.

Her ancestors have lived in Highland County since 1744. She and her husband moved here in 2013. As a native West Virginian, born in Morgantown, there is a pride that runs in her veins of the mountain history, beauty, stubbornness, get-it-done attitude, folklore, strength, resiliency.

When people started asking if she would knit them a gnome, she thought this could be a fundraiser for our library. Jane loves the local library, saying "all the folks who work there are so intelligent and helpful." She instructed HC to hide the first one in the library after Pamm McDowell had shoulder surgery recently, hoping it would help her recover and give her a chuckle. Then she got inspired to knit a gnome for each of the librarians. Jane's intricate knitted gnomes have brought a smile to many!
