Holiday Community Concert

Come out to the Highland Center on Sunday, December 15 at 3 p.m. to get in the spirit of the season with the Highlands Community Orchestra, Highland Community Choir, and Glory Bells handbell choir. Join us for a great afternoon of music and merriment!

The Highlands Community Orchestra, sponsored by the Highland County Arts Council, is directed by Gretta Sandberg. Gretta is an experienced conductor and string teacher with more than 40 years of public school teaching and conducting high school orchestra programs. A Highland County resident, she is the former president of the Virginia String Teachers Association and a recipient of that organization's annual Outstanding Conductor Award.

The Highland Community Chorus was started around 2012 by Gerald Waggoner. Debbi Stephenson, Richard Simmons, and Jason Canze were also instrumental in getting the choir established. Nancy Vance joined as an alto the first couple of years. When Gerald found out she had directed a local church choir, he invited her to direct some pieces for the community choir. As the years went by, she directed more, and when Gerald's health prevented him from directing, she stepped into the role full time. The choir forms every fall for the purpose of presenting a Christmas concert for the community.

The Glory Bells, directed by Richard Simmons, is a three-octave handbell choir that started as a combined group of the Beulah, Monterey, and Pisgah Presbyterian Churches in 2010. Today the group is sponsored by Beulah and Monterey Presbyterian Churches and the majority of the ringers are members of these churches. However, the group includes guest ringers from the Monterey United Methodist Church, Asbury United Methodist Church and The Church of the Good Shepherd. This group of talented musicians work well together to perform beautiful music.
